WATER NEWS

Milwaukee Water Works is the sole supplier of water to the West Allis Municipal Water Utility. This means that all of the water we supply to you has been purchased by us from Milwaukee Water Works (MWW). MWW has filed a case with the Public Service Commission, the State agency that governs water utilities in Wisconsin, requesting permission to increase rates. West Allis and the other wholesale communities have expressed their concerns to the Public Service Commission about the amount and nature of the increase. MWW's new rates are expected to be approved early this summer, and West Allis Municipal Water Utility customers can expect a subsequent increase in water rates after that.

NEW WATER BILL PAYMENT OPTIONS

Did you know that when you go online to have your bank pay your bills, the bank simply cuts a check that they then mail to us? Even though you may have processed the payment timely, these checks can still be delayed and/or lost in the mail. Our new Auto Pay process can eliminate these problems. Simply sign up for the program and your bill payment will be automatically processed from your checking account to pay on the due date. Contact the Water Billing Office for further information about this free service.

Customers can now also set up an online bill payment account via the City Website. Just click on e-services in the upper right of the City's homepage (www.ci.west-allis.wi.us) to create an account. This service is free for e-checks (ACH payments). Charges apply for credit card payments.

DIAL BEFORE YOU DIG

Contacting Diggers Hotline to locate buried lines before beginning an excavation project is **free** to homeowners. If you damage a buried line without calling Diggers Hotline, you are responsible for the damage caused plus a fine of up to \$2,000.

State law requires homeowners and professionals to contact Diggers Hotline at least three working days (not Saturday, Sunday or legal holidays) before doing any excavation work. Plan ahead! The call center is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

These mobile and permanent sites are for **Milwaukee County Residents** to bring items that should not be disposed of with their garbage, poured down the drain, or burned.

Common items accepted are fluorescent light bulbs, oil-based paint, button and rechargeable batteries, fertilizer, solvent-based cleaners, oven cleaner and thermometers. Items not accepted are car batteries, explosives/fireworks, prescription drugs, tires and appliances (washers, refrigerators, clothes dryers, etc.).



POLLUTED URBAN RUNOFF - EVERYBODY'S PROBLEM

Concern over urban runoff in recent years has resulted in the City of West Allis increasing its efforts to minimize the problems associated with runoff. What is runoff? Quite simply, runoff is rain water or water from melting snow that flows off a surface rather than being absorbed. Since urban areas are highly developed and therefore have a high amount of paved and other impervious surfaces, there is a disproportionately high amount of water runoff in urban areas when compared to rural areas. The problem with all of this runoff water is that it frequently contains a variety of pollutants that eventually end up in streams, rivers and lakes. Typical urban pollutants include sediment, nutrients, oxygen demanding materials, bacteria and toxic pollutants such as heavy metals.

To minimize the amount of pollutants entering into the storm sewer system and eventually being transported to Lake Michigan, the City has implemented a rather intensive street sweeping program. Using both mechanical sweepers and vacuum sweepers, major thoroughfares are swept weekly and residential streets are swept biweekly. In addition, the City has stepped up its efforts to remove debris that collects in the sumps at the bottom of street catch basins. Finally, a recently passed ordinance requires larger scale developments and/or redevelopments in the City to prepare and have approved a stormwater management plan for the parcel.

While these types of large-scale activities undertaken by the City will make some impact, every resident can also assist in dealing with this problem. Here are some ways an individual can help: recycle oil; direct home downspouts onto lawns where the water can be absorbed; rather than hosing down a driveway, sweep paved areas to keep waste and debris out of street catch basins; keep your car tuned and repair leaks; limit fertilizer and pesticide use; leave grass clippings on your lawn; clean up your pet waste; dispose of toxic waste properly; wash your car on the lawn or at a car wash to prevent the soapy water from entering street catch basins; and consider constructing a rain garden.

Urban runoff pollution is something that each and every one of us must make a conscious effort to control. Our efforts today will ensure clean water for years to come.

The mediation service offers people to create their own mutually agreeable solutions. Sessions are informal, structured discussions to help clarify the issues and move towards agreement. TELEPHONE BOOKS

Old telephone books can be recycled. Residents should place their old phone books with newspapers and magazines by the curb or in the alley on their regular recycling collection day.

PRIVATE SIGNS ON PUBLIC PROPERTY PROHIBITED



City of West Allis ordinance prohibits, in general, the placement of any sign, poster, banner or advertisement on any public property by persons other than employees of the City. Specifically, private signs such as Rummage Sale, Garage Sale, Open House, House for Sale, and other types of advertisement may not be fastened to or erected on any public pole, tree, sidewalk, street, boulevard or other public property.

Signs which are illegally erected on public property oftentimes obstruct the vision of motorists, interfere with pedestrian traffic and have caused damage to underground street light cable and underground sprinkler systems located in boulevards throughout the City. As a result, residents are cautioned that violation of this ordinance may result in fines of up to \$100. Furthermore, individuals erecting illegal signs will be liable for any damage that may occur as a result of sign placement.

It is not the intention of this ordinance to prohibit advertisement or restrict any type of enterprise. It is, however, important to confine such activities to private property.





HANDLING YOUR YARD WASTE IN 2010


The following information provides West Allis residents with alternatives to dispose of yard waste materials which are currently banned by the state from being collected and disposed of with household waste. Alternatives available vary by item and may include free collection service, collection service with a fee, free drop-off service, drop-off service with a fee, and on-site composting. Please **REMOVE** and save this page for future reference.

YARD WASTE COLLECTION

- Yard waste includes leaves, weeds, thatch, flowers, vines and other non-fruit or vegetable matter.
- **Spring** collection of yard waste is April 11 through April 25, 2010.
- **Fall** collection of yard waste is September 19 through November 14, 2010.
- Yard waste should be placed in the curb-line of the street only during the designated dates listed above.
- **DO NOT MIX BRUSH INTO THE YARD WASTE PILES.**
- Yard waste can be composted on-site* or disposed of, without charge, at a drop-off center. (Please see locations and operating hours on reverse side.)
- **REMOVE POTS AND SOIL FROM POTTED PLANTS BEFORE PLACING IN THE CURB-LINE.**

GRASS CLIPPINGS

Grass clippings should be left on the lawn after mowing or the clippings may be added to an on-site compost pile*. **NO GRASS CLIPPINGS ARE COLLECTED OR ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.** Grass cannot be raked or allowed to blow into the streets where it can clog storm sewers and contaminate run-off water.

- The City will provide every other week collection of small amounts of resident-generated brush, up to 1½ cubic yards, from March 15 through October 8. A separate truck will pick up brush on your recycling pick-up day according to the recycling schedule as shown in the color coded calendar. **NO BRUSH COLLECTION WILL BE MADE DURING THE HOLIDAY WEEKS OF MAY 31, JULY 5 AND SEPTEMBER 6, 2010.**
- Residents should place their brush at the curb on the same day as their recycling collection. Large pieces of brush, up to five feet in length, should be bundled and stacked between the sidewalk and the curb, not in the street. Small pieces of brush must be contained in boxes or cans marked "BRUSH" and the address called in to ensure collection. Do not use plastic bags.
- Amounts larger than 1½ cubic yards require special handling and charge. Please call the Sanitation and Street Division at 302-8800. Permits are available at no charge for residents to take brush to a drop-off site.




